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


Parish Council News

THE BEACON installed this year at Jubilee Park as part of the "Purple Reign" event to celebrate Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee (2022)





Sir Michael Bunbury unveiling the Rendlesham Village Sign as part of the Diamond Jubilee celebrations (2012)



A new low-carbon initiative for the community

Many of our surrounding villages have long-established markets which local makers, growers and farmers sell their wares at to both locals and those that travel to the market. It's time Rendlesham joined in. Not only is it a fun, social event it is one of the goals of Rendlesham's Climate Action Strategy — to promote the benefits of shopping and eating local produce.

On September 11th we had our first stab at a local produce market in the Village Square. It seemed sensible to start small with just a few stalls, some produce, some crafts and good food.

The Rendlesham Shed were selling bird boxes to raise funds for their projects; Paul Stevenson, a local artist, had his fabulous new range of dinosaur cards for sale and Simply Cakes completely sold out of her cupcakes, brownies, sponges and cheesy twists in record time.

The Barstow Family raised money for Sam's trip to the World Scouting Jamboree selling homemade jams and honey, we were lucky that The Guilt Free Soapery could join us and make the Square smell fantastic.

Kat's Creations got their fabric crafts business off to a flying start, and Aime K Studio brightened up everyone's day with her beautiful work. Geoff from Brimwood Farm brought some of his farm produce along to share with

us and his organic double yolk eggs were a winner too!

And *Otis Breading's* delicious Suffolk Sourdough toasties and drinks were a huge success and *Rendlesham Radio* joined us for some chilled tunes in the background as well as hosting two buskers, *Kirk Spall* and *Sam Hughes*.

Thankfully we enjoyed one of the final summery Sundays of 2022 and the event was even better attended than we hoped.

The community even managed to collect lots of litter too!

Why have a market in the first place?

Having a local market brings us together. Small local businesses get a muchneeded spotlight to show their neighbours the best of what they do.

In turn, neighbours meet each other and we all experience the benefits of low carbon shopping. That may be food grown locally, or hand crafted products but all of them are without corporate mark-ups, faceless branding and unknown origins.

With a bit of hard work, some luck and a fair wind, a market in Rendlesham will be a regular feature of 2023.

Running the London Marathon for Zest



Rendlesham resident **Helen Finlinson** works for *St Elizabeth Hospice* and she's putting her best feet forward to run the *London Marathon* on Sunday 2nd October to raise funds for ZEST — a palliative care service for young people with incurable, life limiting conditions such as muscular dystrophy or complex cerebral palsy.

"Before we developed *Zest*, there was no support for young people who'd survived beyond the upper age limit for local children's hospices. That meant they faced losing support right when they needed it most, simply because they'd lived beyond their life expectancy.

"There are also newly diagnosed young people with a condition in early adulthood that needs a model of care that better meets their needs. *Zest* has been created to do that.

"Zest palliative care for young people helps them manage their conditions to boost their quality of life, and helps families live life to the full. We run social groups for young adults, family drop-ins and a parent support group, Zest days and short-break weekends for young adults to come to the hospice together (where we have fun as their families receive vital respite).

"The complex care needs of the young adults require intensive nursing care support. This comes at a cost, and *Zest* relies on charitable funding to make our service possible!

"I have a job I love and I'd still want to do it even if I

won the Lottery. I've met the most inspiring people, who motivate me daily to ensure *Zest* is always there for them.

"And it's an honour to help raise funds for them. I've run a half marathon before, but a last minute space came up for the *London Marathon*, which means I've trained during the hottest summer!

"But when I see what Zest families cope with everyday, I give myself a stern talking to face up to this marathon challenge — and I know that the memories of the Zest young people that are no longer with us (and the inspiration of all the families) will spur me on to do this.

"If you are can support me to reach my £2K fundraising target, I would be hugely encouraged, humbled and very grateful..."

Consumer Corner

SCAM: Energy rebate emails

ACTION FRAUD is

warning the public about a sharp rise in reports relating to fake emails purporting to be from *Ofgem*, the energy regulator for Great Britain.

The emails claim you are due a rebate payment as part of a "government scheme" and gives links for you to follow to apply for the rebate.

The links in the emails lead to malicious websites designed to steal personal and financial information.

Between 22nd August and 5th September 2022, a total of 1,567 phishing emails related to this scam were reported via the *Suspicious Email Reporting Service*.

All the emails display the email subject header "Claim your bill rebate now".

Offenders are using the *Ofgem* brand logo and colours to make the emails look as authentic as possible.

However, the emails ask recipients to "apply for an energy bill rebate before September 2020", which is what prompted many recipients to realise the emails weren't genuine.

How to protect yourself and others

If you have any doubts about a message, contact the organisation directly.

Don't use the numbers or address in the message – use the details from the official Ofgem website.



REMEMBER, your bank (or any other official source) will <u>never</u> ask for personal information via email.

If you receive an email you're not sure about, simply forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk.

You can also send Action Fraud emails that "feel" suspicious, even if you're not certain they're a scam — AF will check them for you

Under the spell of Suffolk's magical oaks...

THE MIGHTY OAK, once so plentiful we didn't think twice about chopping 'em up like matchwood and turning them into Henry VIII's English armada, or building our Suffolk long houses, our churches and cathedrals with them. But there's more to them than that...

The wisdom of the Oaks

Across Europe, the oak was the tallest and strongest tree in the forest. Perhaps that's why the oak is honoured and worshipped in so many ancient cultures. From the Greeks and Norse to the Druids and Slavs, many of the cultures of Europe's olden days have included the oak tree in their mythology.

Oak trees live for a long time. At 400 years young, they're considered "ancient". Our ancestors equated this longevity to wisdom and thus sought the advice of oak trees when making important decisions, one of the reasons Druids held gatherings in (sacred) oak groves.

It's also why ancient Slavs settled disputes under oak trees. They hoped the wisdom of the tree would resolve disputes fairly and without bloodshed(!), not unlike *Judge Rinder* perhaps...

But this practice wasn't just held across Europe. First American chiefs often had important meetings around a "Council Oak", an old and large oak tree.

So the importance of the oak tree to our lives was writ large, in every aspect of life, from the earliest of times.

Root and Branch

Like top basketball players, one reason oak trees were so revered was their height! The

top branches (or so it was thought), extended up into heaven where the gods resided. The roots sank down into the underworld where some cultures thought their ancestors dwelt (that must have been cosy).

And the tree of choice for England's most legendary desperadoes? Robin and his Merry Men met at the *Major Oak* in Sherwood Forest.

to give up on our own Rendlesham oaks yet.

Trees are struggling, cut down to make way for modern life, forests emptied in the name of progress (the polite word for profit).

Whilst trees are vital to our lives for building or heating, they are first and foremost sentient beings, the keepers of ancient knowledge — "libraries of light" if you like.

Hotalics of light. If you like.

Hot Prop-a-tree! Sherwood Forest's "The Major Oak", not too proud to take a little help from its friends to keep on standing...

Look at it now. Between 800 and 1100 years old, weighing in at 23 tonnes (4 elephants), and 10 metres round the middle (that's 10 people standing in a circle arms outstretched).

At that size, you'd need help to keep your arms up too. But it's still going strong, so it proves we don't need Call me fanciful (and that's a lot politer than some of the stuff I'm called!) but trees are calling out for our help right now, so that their presence in the world is replenished and renewed.

Don't roll your eyes!

Try it! Go sit under a tree and see if you don't feel that same connection to every tree in the world too. And if you're really sensitive, you'll feel their sadness too.

There's not much we can do for their loss so far, but we can turn that sadness into hope for their future.

Though we're a big county, Suffolk has only about 8% tree cover because of our open fields and agricultural focus — by comparison, Surrey has 30% tree cover and London has 20% — so whilst there's certainly scope for tree planting in Suffolk, there's also a need to take care of the trees we do have.

But such a proud and noble tree, at the heart of our community. I'm ain't giving up on it without a fight. Are you with me...?

If you are, let's meet at the tree at 10am on Tuesday 1st November to give it a hug, some sacred water and a whole lot of love...

The rest (at least for the time being) is up to the tree. So let's give it what it needs to grow, or assist it to shut itself down with ease and dignity. It will be the tree's call...



BCWM opens its new café this October



The Bentwaters Cold War Museum has had a busy summer!

The volunteer staff have cleared up the compound where trees and undergrowth had grown since the base closed nearly 30 years ago, allowing for more room to exhibit aircraft.

And in August a very successful Anglo-American day was held with classic cars, military vehicles and guests from the *United States Airforce* at Mildenhall, who sent representatives from the *67th Special Operations Squadron* who were based at nearby RAF Woodbridge from 1970 to 1992.

It's their 70th anniversary this year and so a plaque was

unveiled in the new café to honour that achievement.

Grand opening of the new café/shop

And the new cafe/shop has taken shape and is planned to open in October. The old one was falling apart and was only a temporary solution that lasted longer than we thought possible!

The new building is a pair of 40 foot shipping containers welded together with windows and doors fitted and has been transformed into an *American Diner themed café* with the visitor reception and shop to one side.

Outside eating areas will be served from a purpose-built hatch and it will be possible to just drop by to enjoy a



cuppa and cake and not enter the museum if that's what you want.

Museum opening times in October

The museum itself s open in October on the first and third Sundays (2nd and 16th 10-4pm) before it closes for winter, so it's an opportunity for Rendlesham families to come and visit and enjoy your unique local tourist attraction... And, of course, kids are free too!

The staff took the opportunity this year to move exhibits around — here's the *Harrier* and *Hunter* out on the airfield taxiway in the sunshine.

Bentwaters is a significant feature of Rendlesham's history and as it is so well preserved and has a unique museum, it is something to be proud of. Nowhere else in Europe (or maybe USA) has such a museum on a modern base and original Command Post. So it certainly puts Rendlesham on the map!

The Vicar's Voice



I am writing this piece, in readiness for this month's Magazine, a few hours after the death of *Our Sovereign Lady, Queen Elizabeth II*.

I make no excuses for the fact that I wept at this news. As for so many people, the Queen has been the only monarch I have known. At her coronation in 1953, she took on the commitment and obligation of duty.

There is not much I can say that has not already been said since the sad news came that our beloved Queen had died. It seemed such a shock around the world, as only two days before her death there had been photographs of an admittedly frail queen, but with her beaming smile, shaking hands with the newly elected Prime Minister.

But I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to a someone who, as for so many of you reading this ,has been the only monarch I have known. At her coronation, she took on the commitment and obligation of duty. Through her reign, she has seen many changes, the years after the war and the end of rationing, the swinging 60s and the Beatles, the tragic disaster in Aberfan, the beginning and end of Concorde, the space age and a man walking on the moon,

the launch of Telstar, the troubles of Northern Ireland and the death of her "Uncle Dicky" Mountbatten by an IRA bomb, the death of Diana, the advent of the World Wide Web, social media and of course the recent Covid Pandemic and lockdown, during which she went reassures us all, "we will meet again".

On her 21st birthday, whilst on tour with her parents in Cape Town, she gave her most memorable and unforgettable speech,

Princess Elizabeth said those words which were, as she put it, made in her salad days, to come to fruition a few days ago. "I declare before you all, that my whole life, be it long or short, shall be devoted to your service."

And it certainly was devoted to the very end, her final duty which saw one Prime Minster out and welcomed a new one in. She was unstinting in her devotion to duty to the very end. Always with a smile and kind word. How many people have we heard during the last 48 hours who, having had the privilege of meeting her, as she visited factory, school or hospital, or perhaps at a garden party, said she had a way of making them feel special and that she was truly interested in them.

I have never met the Queen, but have been close to her on two occasions, once at a Buckingham Palace Garden Party, and once at Windsor Castle, during an evening when the *Band of the Coldstream Guards* were playing a concert for the Queen and Prince Philip. I was a few feet away from

her, I dressed in Mess Kit, and she carrying her obligatory handbag. There was a space between us. We looked at each. She smiled, and I gave a nod of the head. It is a happy memory.

Another line from her 21st birthday speech, the young princess asked God "to help her make good her vow".

Queen Elizabeth has never shied away from talking about her faith, her belief in God's grace and salvation. In her own words, she has said, "her faith, family and friendship" brought her strength and comfort. Notice that faith comes first.

During her many Christmas broadcasts, she talked of her faith, often quoting bible passages and stories.

Worship and attending church was an important and integral part of her life. Not just for the big ceremonial or state occasions, but quietly and reflectively such as in *Craithie Church* near Balmoral. She relied on her faith to see her through the good times and the bad.

The Princess during that same speech asked God "to bless all who were willing to share in that sense of duty."

I, like so many who have served in Her Majesty's Armed Forces, am proud to have served my Queen and Country through my time as Chaplain in the Army.

In one of her earliest speeches, The Queen said: "I cannot lead you into war, I do not make your laws, I do not administer justice, but I do give you my heart".

And she gave her heart for 70 glorious years.

Her marriage to Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, was also lifelong and, as we know, he was her strength and mainstay.

I'd like to read you a poem. I have no idea who wrote it, but it has been going around on social media since Thursday, and I would like to share it here.

Philip came to me today, and said "it's time to go". I looked at him and smiled as I whispered that "I know".

I then turned and looked behind me, and saw I was asleep, all my family were around me, and I could hear them weep.

I gently touched each shoulder with Philip by my side, then I turned away and walked along with my Angel guide.

Philip held my hand as he led the way, to a world where kings and queens are monarchs every day





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

What's been happening in Woodbridge?

WOODBRIDGE MUSEUM

WTMM has installed a micro-generator to demonstrate electricity generation from hydropower.

The purpose is to educate and provide activities around STEM themes for the many KS1 and KS2-3 students who visit the Mill.

The micro-generator takes its energy from the *Crown Wheel Lay Shaft* in the Mill. It is coupled to outputs such as phone chargers, a light bulb and a voltmeter for visitors to see the electricity generated. Key Stage 1, 2, and 3 students will have accompanying materials to explain the process, the

importance of sustainable energy sources and hands-on activities are planned such as simple circuit building.

Education Lead Heather Sheehan said: "I am delighted we can use this generous grant to expand our educational offering. It is paramount we teach children about renewable energy sources and sustainability. These sessions will support teachers to do just that."

Gardening with Thompson & Morgan

What to "sow and grow" this October

Crisp autumnal days bring changing colours, longer nights, and the occasional frost.

You may be harvesting fruit and veg, but you can also start planting borders and containers with spring flowering bulbs this month.

FLOWERS to sow & grow

Start hollyhock seeds undercover now. Pot up seedlings and over-winter in a cold frame.

Sow sweet peas and place them in the cold frame over winter for planting in spring.

Sow *Aquilegia vulgaris* in a cold frame ready to plant out next spring.

Oriental poppies can be sown into pots and placed in a cold frame over winter.

Sow Hellebore seeds in pots in a cold frame. (Germination can be slow, so be patient!)

DIRECT SOW OUTDOORS

There's still time to sow hardy annuals such as cornflowers, *Limnanthes douglasii* (the poached egg plant) or annual poppies, like and larkspur. They'll flower earlier next year if sown now.



Sow wildflower seeds direct to the ground to attract bees and butterflies next year.

PLANT OUTDOORS

Plant daffodil bulbs, allium bulbs and crocus bulbs for a glorious spring display. Dot them through borders, or to naturalise in grass.

Plant out any perennials & biennials you've grown from seed this year.

It's the ideal time to plant clematis. Try 'Kokonoe' for large purple double blooms in summer, or *Clematis armandii* for highly scented flowers in early spring.

HERBS/VEGETABLES to sow & grow

Remember to directly sow winter lettuce, like for early spring harvesting

Sow winter salad, and grow in greenhouses, cold frames

or cloches throughout the winter. 'Winter Gem' lettuce can be sown from September to January in an unheated greenhouse or cold frame.

Herbs like basil, dill, chives, and parsley can be sown now and grown on the windowsill throughout the winter.

Sow spring onions under cloches — they'll be ready to start harvesting in the spring.

Sow cauliflower 'All the Year Round' and keep the plants in a cold frame until spring.

DIRECT SOW OUTDOORS

Sow winter lettuce such as 'Arctic King' directly into the ground this month.

Winter-hardy pea 'Meteor' can be directly sown now for cropping next spring.

Direct sow green manures like 'Phacelia' and 'Crimson Clover' over empty beds and plots for a cheap and easy way to increase soil fertility.

Sow broad bean 'Aquadulce Claudia' outdoors for the earliest crops next year.

PLANT OUTDOORS

Plant autumn onion and shallot sets now for an early harvest next summer. Try 'Centurion' and 'Troy'.

Sow autumn garlic sets this month — try elephant garlic

for large bulbs that are perfect for roasting!

Plant out spring cabbages, like traditional 'Durham early' for harvesting in February onwards.

Plant out ornamental kale, such as 'Rainbow Candy Crush' for 'cut and come again' leaves over winter and into spring. The bright purple leaves bring colour to the winter veg patch!

Plant out winter lettuces.


FRUIT to sow & grow

Make sure you have acidic soil for blueberry plants to thrive and grow

Now's the perfect time to order strawberry runners to plant up a strawberry patch for cropping next year.

Plant blueberry plants. Make sure you have an acid soil or alternatively grow them in pots of ericaceous compost.

It's the ideal time to plant bare root fruit trees. Dwarf varieties for a balcony, or try larger rootstocks for starting an orchard — either way prepare to enjoy delicious fruit next year straight from your garden or allotment.



Transition Woodbridge

Are there any batty people out there?

ANY BATS OUT THERE?

Throughout the summer months, *Transition Woodbridge* has set up bat monitoring posts in gardens across Woodbridge and Melton.

Gardens in our *Wildlife*Corridors project have hosted the post with the bat monitor for two weeks.

Bats are a useful indicator of the biodiversity in our area. They roost in trees, hedges, buildings and underground and create corridors between them for feeding.

Amongst other things, bats eat insects like moths (which in turn feed on plants such as buddleia), so this gives an idea of our local moth populations too.

Bats and Bowlers

We're working with **Mark Bowler**, a bat expert at the *University of Suffolk*, to monitor bat types and activity across the area.

The recorders will be analysed by his students next year and the results available next Spring/Summer 2023.



Citizen Science

Our *Citizen Science* groups are starting to analyse wildlife patterns across the gardens in our scheme.

The more gardens taking part in our project, the better the picture from the data.

They're the only mammals capable of controlled flight and their aerobatic skills have to been seen to be believed!

British bats eat insects and that's it. This makes them valuable allies to farmers and gardeners seeking to reduce insect numbers — as some insects damage crops and flowers.


