



These include helping local organisations, climate action, bringing allotments to the village, creating a neighbourhood plan, establishing a youth strategy, managing Jubilee Park, public seating and litter bins, and production of the monthly magazine delivered to all households and businesses in Rendlesham.

Councillors are elected to represent the local community, so you must either live or work in the council area. Becoming a councillor is a rewarding experience as you will be able to make a change in your community to help improve residents' lives. A councillor's role can include developing strategies and plans for the area, helping with problems and ideas, representing the community, working with other local community groups, decision making and

reviewing decisions and talking to the community about their needs and what the council is doing.

Local councils can only be as helpful, connected and energetic as the people elected to run them, so we need councillors capable, enthusiastic and engaged to reflect their communities.

Changes for the 2023 elections

The Electoral Commission

Voter ID

The UK Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections.

This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable. You can use any of the following:

- Passport
- Driving Licence (incl. Provisional License)
- Blue Badge
- Certain Concessionary Travel Cards

- Identity Card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration Document
- Defence Identity Card
- Certain National Identity cards

For more information on which forms of photo ID will be accepted, visit electoralcommission.org.uk /voterID or call their helpline on 0800 328 0280.

If you don't have an accepted form photo ID

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a **Voter Authority**Certificate. You can apply for this at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk.

Alternatively, you can complete a paper application


form and send this to the electoral services team at your local council.

S-T-U-F-F

We are surrounded by it! Some of us have so much we even pay to store it!

This month we look at how we buy, use and dispose of resources. Is it possible to change our relationship with them so that we share more, create connections with community, regain lost skills, save money and reduce our impact on the planet.

The *Linear Economy* results in a lot of natural resources being wasted in our *Take*, *Make*, *Use*, *Dispose*, *Waste*" lifestyle.

In the UK we live as if there were three planets at our disposal, with each person disposing of half a tonne of waste each year.

Only 12% comes from our homes with business and industry making up the rest... those businesses and industries we buy from.

We could learn a lot from nature where there is no waste. It is possible to create ways of living like this, a *Circular Economy*.

Forget the 3Rs

To move towards this, we need to expand our knowledge of the 3Rs to more like 8Rs!

 It starts with RETHINK and REFUSE; and changing our thinking



about what we buy and consume.

- We can REDUCE what we have habitually wasted on things like energy and material goods.
- RE-USE our old objects and sharing with others is not only planet saving but fashionable and fun.
- Can you find a way to REPAIR things that are broken or find someone that can do this for you?
- Unwanted or unloved stuff can be REGIFTED! There is no shame in giving something you will store or throw away to someone that will enjoy it.
- RECOVERING energy and materials to use and upcycle is extremely efficient.
-and if you can't do these things, RECYCLE!

Electronics

Every year an estimated 2 million tonnes of waste electronic items are discarded including 160, 000 in our bins. This wastes very valuable resources.

According to **WRAP** (*Waste Resources Action Programme*) about a quarter of the electrical items taken to recycling centres can be used or repaired.

Why not take these items to one of the local Repair Cafes?

Or why not pay a visit to **suffolkrepairshed.org**

Clothing

Clothing is a massively planet-damaging industry with fast-fashion being the biggest culprit. Every year an estimated 336,000 tonnes of

clothing goes to landfill or incineration. This is a huge waste of the water, chemicals and pollution involved in clothing manufacture. Sharing, swapping or selling on, vital to breaking this worrying trend.

Make sure you are up to date with what can be recycled kerbside and what you can take to other places. These do change sometimes so it's worth checking a couple of times a year.

Home Composting

Home composting is the most environmentally friendly way of disposing of your garden and food waste.

You can find all the information you need including how to make your own compost area or get a bin for only £10 at:

www.suffolkrecycling.org. uk/reduce-your-waste/ home-composting

If you can't make your own avoiding buying peat based compost as this is essential in preserving habitats and carbon sequestration.



Disability Advice Service (East Suffolk)

DAS offers free, confidential and impartial advice to disabled children and adults, and their carers/families, in East Suffolk. They share some timely advice with us.

Fuel Poverty

1 million of the 4.8 million households on prepayment meters receive disability benefits and magistrates are granting warrants for forced installations of them, enabling debt collectors to force entry into people's homes on behalf of energy firms. The All-Party Parliamentary Group for Fuel Poverty and Energy Efficiency is putting pressure on the Government to halt these forced installations.

DAS tells us they're here to help if you're struggling with your energy bills. They also advise "Don't leave it too late, bury your head in the sand or feel embarrassed. We have energy experts and a crisis team — we also have a welfare fund to help people in dire situations."

So give DAS a call as soon as you begin to struggle.

Accessible Homes

A decision has been approved by East Suffolk Council's Cabinet to merge three grants for changes to the homes of disabled people into one non-means-tested grant of up to £15,000.

ESC's Independent Living Team has been working on this change for 2.5 years and, although it needs to gain full council approval, the unanimous Cabinet vote has certainly been a positive step.

If you need help with making changes to your home, DAS can help you find out what







you're entitled to claim, and on the process involved.

PIP, ESA and Universal Credit Claims

The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) is looking

into the way that PIP, ESA and Universal Credit claims are decided. It means that some people won't need to fill in lengthy paperwork or attend health assessments.



The DWP has said it plans to try out a more streamlined system by testing it with people with disabilities and life changing conditions.

Currently, the average wait for a PIP claim is 18 weeks. Whatever help you need with benefit entitlement or appealing benefit decisions, get in touch — DAS has a 100% success rate with benefits appeals.

Becoming "Disability Confident"

A shout out to local employers that it's time to become disability confident.

DAS suggests you take a look at the Government's "Disability Confident" scheme that allows you to learn and earn accreditations that help you employ people from a huge pool that you weren't dipping into before.

Of course, if you're an employee, ask your boss if they've heard of the Scheme...

Veggie, keto, low-carb & Valentine's Day



If you're eating keto-styley, cutting out the carbs and giving up the meat, you'd think sexy lurvve food on Valentine's Day would be impossible. We beg to differ. Try this menu from DietDoctor.com (and save space for pudding!)

STARTERS — Goat's Cheese Salad with Balsamico Butter

Ingredients

280g goat cheese 60ml (33g) pumpkin seeds 55g butter 1 tbsp balsamic vinegar 85g (650ml) baby spinach

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 400°F (200°C).
- Put slices of goat cheese in a greased baking dish and bake for 10 mins.
- Toast the pumpkin seeds in a dry frying pan over fairly high heat until they colour and start to pop.
- Lower the heat, add butter and simmer until it turns golden brown and has a pleasant nutty scent. Add balsamic vinegar; let it boil for a few minutes. Turn off the heat.
- Spread the baby spinach on a plate. Place the cheese on top and add the balsamico butter.

MAIN COURSE — Creamy Low Carb Cauliflower Mushroom Risotto

Ingredients

750g cauliflower 425ml double cream 85g butter, divided 1 tbsp onion powder 3 tbsp lemon juice 85g Parmesan cheese salt & ground black pepper 280g (950ml) mushrooms 2 garlic cloves

To serve:

2 thsp pine nuts 3 thsp fresh thyme or fresh parsley



55g Parmesan cheese 1 tbsp olive oil

Instructions

- Rinse/trim the cauli and shred with the coarse side of a grater, or divide into florets and pulse in a food processor until rice-sized.
- Add cream, half of the butter, onion powder, and lemon juice in a large pan and bring to a simmer.
- Add the cauliflower and simmer on medium heat, for 15-20 minutes or until it is as tender as you like it.
- Add coarsely grated parmesan cheese and let it melt while you mix it in.
 Season to taste.
- While the cauli risotto is simmering, fry the sliced mushrooms and garlic in the rest of the butter until golden. Season with salt and pepper.
- Heat a small, dry pan over medium heat. Add the pine nuts. Stir constantly to prevent burning. Toast until they get some colour.
- Add the mushrooms to the "risotto" and stir to combine. You can also add the mushrooms on top.

 Serve the "risotto" with freshly chopped herbs and some extra parmesan. Top with toasted pine nuts and sprinkle with olive oil.

PUDDING — Low Carb Chocolate Mess with Berries and Cream

Ingredients For the Chocolate Cake:

260g 80% dark chocolate 140g butter 5 eggs 1 pinch salt

1 tsp vanilla extract

To serve:


230g (450 ml) fresh raspberries or blueberries 1 tsp vanilla extract 6 tbsp lime juice 110g pecans, chopped 45g (130ml) roasted unsweetened coconut chips 475ml whipping cream or crème fraiche


Instructions

• Preheat the oven to 320°C (160°C). Use a spring form, maximum 20-22cm in diameter. Grease it with some butter or coconut oil and line with parchment.

- Break the chocolate into pieces, dice the butter. Melt together in a double boiler or the microwave. (Chocolate can burn so stir often). Let it cool a little when melted.
- Separate the eggs and put the yolks and whites in separate bowls. Add the salt to the egg whites and whisk until stiff peaks form. Set aside.
- Add the vanilla to the volks; whisk until smooth.
- Pour the melted chocolate and butter into the egg volks and mix well.
- Fold in the egg whites.
 Keep folding until you can't see any white streaks from the egg whites (but no longer).
- Pour the batter into the form and bake for 15-20 minutes. Probe with a knife to see when it's ready. (It should be moist, but not runny.)
- To serve, mix berries, lime juice and vanilla in a small bowl. Let them sit for a few minutes.
- Pour the cream into a large bowl and whip it until soft peaks form.
- Divide the dark chocolate cake into bite sizes with your fingers. Add to your serving plates.
- Top with the berries and sprinkle coconut flakes and nuts.
- Serve immediately with a generous amount of whipped heavy cream or crème fraiche.

Year 5 & 6 Autumn Learning at Rendlesham Primary School

Holes, Onions and Transporting Towers

This past term we have been reading the book *Holes* by Louis Sachar.

As a result of the story, we embarked upon a project to

from table height to the floor; creating card cities using self-created 3D nets to building towers (with no glue or tape) that could hold 100g weights made from scrap paper.

Throughout the process the children were curious and imaginative – constantly reflecting on their designs, always failing more times than they succeeded until they were able to produce a

trophy that may (or may not) just have been constructed from a wooden Christmas bauble!

The Final Frontier – The STEM Space Mobile

In science, we were looking at the planets of the solar system and consequently the classes had to create a solar system model that could demonstrate the heliocentric model of the planets and their relation to the Sun.

This presented many construction problems that the students had to independently and collaboratively overcome – from joining wood with no glue or nails to creating 3D planets from flat card.

Mathematical measuring skills were also utilised in this project to ensure a semblance of scaling.

During our science study, we discovered that no scale model is really able to do justice to and demonstrate the vast sizes and distances between planets – but we gave it a go nonetheless!







help our fictional Yelnats Zeroni Onion Company

(based on an endeavour undertaken by two of the characters in the story) to complete an onion transportation task.

We combined this with the *Design & Technology* question for the term: How can we use mechanics to simplify manual labour?

Consequently, the challenge for the classes was to create a structure and machine that could transport onions from the top of a mountain (God's Thumb in the book) to the bottom, using a pulley system that made the job easier.

The students undertook a series of mini challenges – from transporting figures

prototype that fulfilled the onion-transporting brief.

The results were creative and ingenious across all classes.

Finally, a winner was chosen from each class who solved the problem most effectively, thus becoming the proud owner of a **Golden Onion**

There's nothing quite so wonderful as hearing bird song and watching them in flight. Unfortunately, recently the ability of birds to find proper nesting areas have decreased due to the increase in human activity and population centres.

National Nest Box Week gives people the chance to contribute to the conservation effort while also allowing the opportunity at some calm and peaceful bird watching.

History of National Nest Box Week

National Nest Box Week launched in 1997 by the British Trust for Ornithology — a research institute that tracks the changes in bird populations to inform the public and help form environmental policies.

With over 40,000 volunteer bird-watchers, *National Nest Box Week* encourages people to pay attention to the local nesting birds in the area and encourages people to put up nest boxes to support the conservation of breeding birds.

According to BTO, the increase in landscaping and property restoration has cause many birds to speed up their breeding season, laying up to 30 days earlier than usual since the 1960s. Because of *National Nest Box Week*, over 6 million boxes have been placed in gardens in the United Kingdom alone.

National Nest Box Week gives people a first look into the world of birds by helping them pay attention to the world around them and giving people a chance to give back to the natural environment.



The Vicar's Voice

It only feels like 5 minutes ago that we were putting the Christmas decorations and nativity figures back in the loft or under the stairs — and now we find ourselves welcoming the season of **Lent** which begins with **Ash Wednesday** on the 22nd of this month.



In church on **Ash Wednesday** we will be holding our *Service of Ashing*, (when the priest makes the sign of the cross on peoples foreheads with ash, made from burning the previous year's palm crosses), marking the start of the penitential 40 days of Lent as we remember Christ's 40 days in the desert

In the 4th and 5th centuries, *The Desert Fathers* (men who went into the desert for silence, solitude and

communion with God), found hardship, hunger and temptation (just as Jesus did) but out of their experiences grew the monastic tradition which has shaped Eastern and Western Christianity.

The services of morning and evening prayer that priests and ministers still say, the use of the psalms and the way the priest lifts up both hands for the Eucharistic prayer may all be traced back at least as far as the practices of the desert fathers and mothers.

Thankfully, we will not be spending Lent in the desert, but we can find silence and solitude in our lives and the simplest way to do that is through saying our prayers.

And there are no right or wrong ways to say prayers, it only matters most that we say them!

However, even the best intentions can fail when faced with practical difficulties, mainly the hustle and bustle of daily lives which overtakes the best laid plans we might make.

With a busy and hectic family and or working life, it can be difficult to find somewhere where can you be alone, undisturbed and unobtrusive? And how long do we pray for, 5 minutes, 20 minutes, or longer?

Rabbi Lionel Blue reckoned that it took him about 20 minutes to relax into prayer and then sometimes just one line of a psalm or prayer spoke to him.

For many people it's much less than that. We each find our own rhythm, and prayers can actually be said anywhere and in any place, whilst walking the dog, weeding or pruning in the garden, preparing the dinner or even washing the dishes or loading the dishwasher!

In the end it doesn't matter where or when you pray – just do it.

And we have already been given a prayer which we can say when our own words

seem to fail us, because Jesus already gave them to us.

The Carmelite nun, **St Teresa of Lisieux**, known as the "Little Flower of God" once wrote that if we say the Lord's Prayer once a day, from the heart, we don't need other words, they are all we need.

So this Lent, it doesn't matter where or when you say it, why not just say it!







It's all change at Foxhall Recycling Centre

Temporary changes during the next phase of redevelopment at Foxhall Recycling Centre



Users of **Foxhall Recycling Centre** near Ipswich are being advised of major works that will temporarily mean fewer parking spaces and reduced access to the facility, as part of a £7.8 million redevelopment programme.

Starting on January 26 this phase of work is scheduled to last until the Summer and will raise the site level to allow for the removal of steps when using containers for recycling — making it

easier for users and improving access from Foxhall Road.

It is the largest part of the construction work taking place and will temporarily limit the amount of space available for public use.

During this time, cars and car-derived vans, plus those with small trailers, can continue to use the site as usual through the online booking system.

However, vans, vans with trailers, cars with large trailers and trade waste <u>must</u> use an alternative site.

The nearest alternative sites are in Carr Road, Felixstowe, or Portman's Walk (off Sir Alf Ramsey Way, in Ipswich).

There will also be no collection bins for textiles, glass, or paper recycling at Foxhall during this time.

Alternative banks for glass and textiles can be found all over the county by using the Suffolk recycling bank locator, while paper can be disposed of thorough household recycling bins.

The redevelopment of Foxhall began last October and, once complete, will provide increased capacity for vehicles on site, reduced queuing, improved access from Foxhall Road, and greater capacity to meet future growth.

This phase also sees the recycling centre's charity **Re-use Shop** temporarily re-locate to *The Ancient House* in Ipswich. It is anticipated the Re-use Shop will move back to the site in Spring.

The move will allow it to continue to sell items such as sports equipment, kitchen supplies, books, and toys collected at the 11 recycling centres across Suffolk and which would otherwise have been disposed of as waste.

Proceeds from sales go to *The Benjamin Foundation*, which has been supporting young people in Suffolk and Norfolk for more than 25 years.

Starry Starry Nights



How many stars will you count?

Nothing beats looking upwards to see velvety blackness, with twinkling constellations as far as the eye can see.

Star-filled skies are one of the most magical sights our countryside has to offer.

CPRE, the countryside charity, wants to reconnect people across the country with the wonder of a truly dark sky.

Their research shows that light pollution is leaving fewer stars than ever visible to the naked eye, and they need your help to track how light levels are changing.

Last year, thousands of you took part and they hope you'll join them again this year too!

Your counts help the CPRE make a map of where star-spotters are enjoying deep, dark skies. By mapping where light pollution is most serious, the CPRE can work with local councils and to decide what to do about it.

So they're asking you to choose a clear night between 17-24 February 2023 and look to the skies to see how many stars you can spot within Orion.

Don't worry, they'll give lots of guidance so you know where to look! It's a great, easy piece of stargazing for

KIDS' Recipe Corner

Ingredients

50g butter

450g potatoes, peeled and cut into 1cm pieces 1 small onion, cut the same size as the potatoes

450g white parts of leeks, sliced (save the green tops for another soup or stock)

850ml-1.2litres/1.5-2pts chicken or vegetable stock 142ml carton whipping cream

125ml full-fat milk

To finish

A small knob of butter, Finely chopped chives



Method

- 1. Melt 50g butter in a heavy saucepan. Add 450g potatoes, cut into 1cm cubes, 1 small onion, cut the same as the potatoes, and 450g white parts of leeks, sliced and toss them in the butter until they are well coated.
- 2. Season well with salt and freshly ground pepper and toss again. then cover the pan with its lid.
- 3. Cook over a gentle heat for 10 mins, or until the vegetables are soft but not coloured.
- 4. Pour in 850ml of chicken or vegetable stock, bring to the boil and simmer until the vegetables are just cooked about 5 minutes.
- 5. Purée in a blender until silky smooth, in batches if necessary, then taste and adjust the seasoning. Return the soup to a clean pan and stir in three quarters of a 142ml carton of whipping cream and 125ml full-fat milk.

MixCloud monitor all the shows and artists using their platform to see what's trending around the world. Every week the charts are refreshed to showcase hundreds of shows.


Our presenters produce a wide range of quality shows which ensures our shows reach these charts and this is a great way to raise our visibility on *MixCloud* as a radio station and a village.

Our ranking in their charts plays a huge factor in our content's discoverability on the platform and in building a radio community. Now we'd like to get find out the what YOU want to hear on your radio station, to make sure we serve our home community too.

How MixCloud works

There are 391 categories with dedicated charts on *MixCloud*. So, every time a show is uploaded it is in competition with all the other shows and artists in that category and is in the running to be included in that chart for that week.

To keep the charts fair and constantly refreshing, shows can only be ranked in their first week (since upload).








Chart rankings fluctuate based on engagement ie. how many favourites shares, and listens the shows generate.

How long people stay listening to your show (and how many of them share it externally off the platform) has the biggest influence on each show's chart position.

MixCloud takes the greatest care to priority authentic engagement vs shallow plays (ie. fans genuinely wanting to listen all the way through).

As soon as a show has been broadcast we upload the

recording to MixCloud, stating which genre of music or subject (if it's a talk show) it is. This ensures that we are more discoverable and thus more likely to land on one of our genre chart pages.


