Water, water everywhere but...

According to the UN, water is the primary medium through which we will feel the effects of climate change.

The UK has increasingly become water stressed, and experiences longer, more frequent droughts, putting us in danger of supply not being able to meet demand. The latest report from the *Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change* states that water stress in Africa could displace 700 million people by 2030.

Each person in the UK uses about 150 litres of water a day, around a third of this water runs down the plug hole or toilet without being used. The key to water efficiency is reducing this waste, not necessarily restricting use.



Your WATER footprint

Most people have heard of a carbon footprint. But what is a water footprint? In the same way that producing any goods e.g. food, clothing, electrical goods, building materials etc, requires energy and produces carbon emissions, the same things also require water. If we take



into account our 'virtual' water use, or water footprint, it is more like 3,400 litres a day per person in the UK. By making small behavioural changes and choosing more water efficient products we can reduce our domestic use and our global impact.

Waterwise is a charity focused on reducing UK water consumption. They highlight the connection between water usage and energy, food, health and social justice and raise awareness of the link between water and multiple areas of our daily lives to show just how important saving water is. They have loads of great resource — see **www.waterwise.org.uk**

Baths and Showers:

If every home in the UK took one minute off their shower every day it would save \pounds 215 million on our energy bills every year. (Waterwise, 2021)

Around 70% of our home water use is in the bathroom. Baths use 80-100 litres of water, whereas an ordinary shower uses a third of that.

The average UK resident spends 7 mins in the shower and this length of time is increasing. Electric showers use very little water (around 4-7 litres); mixed showers connected to bath taps use on average around 10-12 litres; but power showers use more water than a bath (and watch your electricity meter shoot up while this is on, it's about the same as boiling a kettle). Power showers can use as much as 20 litres of water a minute.

Toilets

About a third of all the drinkable water we use in our homes is flushed down the toilet! An old style single flush toilet can use up to 14 litres of water in one flush. New, more water-efficient dual-flush toilets use only 6 litres for a full flush, and 4 litres with a reduced flush.

- If your toilet is pre-2001 then consider installing a cistern displacement device, or CDD such as a "Save a Flush" bag or a "Hippo". These are available for free from most water companies. They are put in the cistern where they displace about 1 litre of water every time you flush. Fitting a CDD to a 7.5 litre cistern in a 2 person household would save around \pounds ,23 per year. Fitting a *Hippo-9* would save around $f_{.58}$ per year!
- Check the water level in your cistern is set correctly to the mark (about 5mm below the overflow). If it is only just below the overflow, it will be flushing about 1 litre more than needed.
- Check the cistern mechanism are not faulty, this can cause water to trickle from the cistern into the toilet bowl.

• Many people flush a range of things down the toilet that end up blocking the sewers and polluting our beaches after storm overflows. There has been a big increase in so called flushable wipes ending up on our beaches, as well as sanitary products.

Only THREE things should be flushed down the loo — Pee, Poo and Paper!

Taps

Dripping taps often just need a new washer, which costs only pence. And if a hot water tap is dripping, you're also paying for the gas or electricity that's just going straight down the drain, also causing unnecessary CO2 emissions. About 20% of a typical gas-heated household heating bill is heating the water for showers, baths and hot water from the tap — on average around £135 a year.

- Make sure your water pipes and external taps are lagged for the cold winter months. Burst water pipes can cause serious damage as well as waste a lot of water. If you need to run a tap, turn it down to a trickle; it will usually work just a well and use up to 50% less water.
- Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth — a running tap wastes 6 litres per minute.
- Collect used water to put on your plants or garden.

Laundry

The average water consumption of washing machines is about 50 litres per wash, and clothes washing accounts for about 15% of the water we use in our homes — so by reducing wastage in this area we can make big water savings.

Washing machines vary. Some use up to 20 litres per kilogram while others as little as 6 litres. Washing at a lower temperature will save on water heating costs, and many products now work at lower temperatures.

- Most washing can be done at 30C to save energy
- When replacing your old washing machine, make sure to buy a water efficient model. See rankings at www.which.co.uk.
- When using your washing machine, make sure to use a full load every time and get to know your washing machine cycle options. Some settings provide the

same cleaning power but with less water and energy.

• Avoid pre-washing. Most modern machines and powders are so effective that you don't have to pre-rinse.

Dishes

The kitchen tap and dishwasher account for about 8-14% of water used in the home so there's a big opportunity here to reduce water wastage. Kitchen taps vary tremendously in flow volume, from 2-25 litres per minute, and behaviours such as how much you twist the tap, and for how long you leave it on, influence how much water is used when you wash up.

Washing up or rinsing dishes under a running tap uses dozens of litres of water, but if you use a washing up bowl or plug you can reduce water wastage by over 50%. A common misconception is that dishwashers use more water. In fact, they can be water savers if used wisely on a full load. Modern models use as little as 10 litres.

Outdoors

Outdoor water use accounts for around 7% of the total water use, but in summer this can rise significantly.

Many of us still use drinking quality, very expensive, cleaned and treated tap water on our lawns and gardens.

Instead of using tap water to water the garden, collect rainwater from your roofs in water butts and/or consider reusing dirty water, or grey water on the garden.

You can also consider what you plant (try looking out for more drought tolerant varieties). The *Royal Horticultural Society* website has advice on minimising water use in the garden and plants to grow in a changing climate.

- If you must use a hose, try fitting it with a trigger gun to control the flow.
- Mulching not only keeps away water-loving weeds, but keeps the soil cool and decreases evaporation by up to 75%
- Giving your plants' roots a good soak once or twice a week in dry weather is much better than lightly watering them every day.
- Don't overwater plants that can weaken them. Instead, direct the water underneath the foliage.

Bentwaters Cold War Museum 2023, a year of anniversaries for the local area



This year we celebrate the 80th anniversary of the opening of *RAF Woodbridge* in 1943 and the 30 year anniversary of the closure of both the *United States Air Force* bases of Bentwaters and Woodbridge in 1993.

Not only that, it's the 20th anniversary of the forming of the *Bentwaters Aviation Society*, the charity support group for Bentwaters Cold War Museum!

Bentwaters' beginnings

The construction of both Bentwaters and Woodbridge started in 1942, though it was Woodbridge that opened first in November 1943 as an *R*AF *Emergency Landing* ground for aircraft that were damaged or running out of fuel as they returned from missions.

Meanwhile, Bentwaters was originally meant to be an American bomber base, but there was a slowdown in requirement for new bases and it was eventually handed over to the RAF in 1944 although only basic construction was completed and it lacked much of the infrastructure that a fully operational airfield needed.

So it wasn't until December 1944 that the first of six RAF squadrons, equipped with the formidable *Mustang* fighter aircraft, arrived. But by January 1945 there was a full complement of about 90 aircraft — a considerable number for a single base.

Birdie Bird-Wilson

The first commander was Wing Commander H A C "Birdie" Bird-Wilson shown here in February 1945 standing by the tail of his North American Mustang Mark III, KH500 'HB-W' at Bentwaters.

The rudder bears the mailed gauntlet badge of *No.17 Squadron R*/*AF*, with whom Bird-Wilson began his operational service fighting with them in France until the *Battle of Britain* when bomber sweeps into mainland Europe.

After the war, Birdie came back to Bentwaters as Officer Commanding, No. 1335 Jet Conversion Unit and then 226 Operational Conversion Unit when both the last of the propeller fighter types and the new jets were used to train pilots.

Birdie began his career in the RAF in 1937 and amongst many other senior positions he was Station Commander at RAF *Coltishall*.



he was shot down on 24th September 1940 by famous Luftwaffe pilot, *Adolf Galland* ("Birdie" was his 40th victim and was seriously burnt).

When he recovered, Birdie led the Mustangs as they provided bomber escort for Lancaster and Halifax bombers and made fighter He retired in 1974 as an Air Vice Marshall and passed away in 2000 aged 81.

Bentwaters' endings

Fast forward to 1993 and Bentwaters as a military airfield comes to an end following the end of the Cold War after the collapse of the Soviet Union. The final operational mission flown by the 81st TFW was carried out on 19th February 1993 — when four A-10s performed their farewell flypasts over several East Anglian air bases.

Flight operations by the 81st finally came to an end on 23rd March 1993 when the last two A-10s departed for their new home at *Spangdahlem Air Base* in Germany.

They were flown by **Col Roger R. Radcliff**, the 81st TFW Commander (shown in the photos waving from the cockpit) and his Deputy Commander for Operations (DCO), **Col Wally Berg**.

The 81st TFW formal inactivation ceremony was held at Bentwaters on 21st May 1993, with actual deactivation on 1st July 1993.

End of an era

The history of the twin bases is a remarkable story of RAF and USAF units, both with many diverse aspects worthy of study.

It began with RAF Mustang fighters at Bentwaters, and an Emergency Landing Ground at Woodbridge then 42 years involving both bases with USAF fighters providing first air defence, then nuclear strike and ending with ground attack.

This together with a rescue/ special operations squadron at Woodbridge makes for a fascinating and absorbing subject.

The eCrime campaign urges consumers to:

- Use GOV.UK to find government services – it is the easiest and most secure place to find government services and information online.
- Go to GOV.UK and use its search function instead of searching for the services you need through a search engine. That way, you'll <u>know</u> you're on the official site.

- If you do use a search engine, look out for the differences between natural search results and paid-for search results.
- Report a misleading or 'copycat' site to the *Citizens Advice Scams Action Service* via www.citizensadvice.org. uk/consumer/scams/ get-help-with-onlinescams/

Rendlesham Primary School Years 5&6 dissect pigs' hearts!

Years 5 and 6 have been looking at the cardiovascular system this term in Science.

We started off learning the different parts of blood: red blood cells, white blood cells, platelets and plasma. The children were fascinated learning about their own blood, particularly how white blood cells engulf bacteria and viruses, and how platelets clot the blood.

Riley said: "Now every time 1 fall over, 1 check my cut to see my scab and know its platelets working!"

Smoothie operators

To help solidify our learning and know the ratios of each, we created our own **blood smoothies**. We used frozen raspberries as our red blood cells, marshmallows to represent white blood cells, sprinkles as platelets and pineapple juice as our plasma. They received mixed reviews for taste...

Holly said: "The smoothies helped the amount of each blood cell stick in my mind, but I wasn't a fan of drinking it as I found it quite lumpy!"

After we were happy with the components, we looked at what blood vessels exist in our body, namely veins, arteries and capillaries.

Fletcher couldn't believe that "if we unwound them all and laid them out they would be able to go more than twice round the world".

We then looked at the organ responsible for pumping the blood through these vessels: the heart. We learned that the average adult has 5 litres of blood in their body and the heart pumps this amount







of blood in a minute. We got the stopwatch out and tried to beat the clock, scooping 5 litres of make-shift blood from container into another.

Zac didn't manage to beat the heart: "It was harder than I thought ... the heart works harder than I thought!"

This gave us an appreciation of how much work the heart has to do, but we wanted to learn a little more about its



structure. So we contacted a local butcher and arranged to have pig hearts ready for dissection! Pig hearts are often used for dissection since anatomically and sizewise they are very similar to ours. Initially, the children were a little apprehensive, but when they realised that the heart is often discarded they were happy we were creating a purpose for them.



Heart surgeons

There was a lot of buzz and chatter before the day finally arrived. The children were given latex gloves, cutting implements and a sheet. We refreshed what we already knew about the structure of the heart and then it was time for each group of three to be given one!

We looked at the weight, and size of the heart. Generally, due to the importance of the heart, the children thought it was smaller than they had anticipated. We identified the *aorta, vena cava, pulmonary artery* and *pulmonary vein*.

It was then dissection time. We cut into the heart along the *coronary sulcus*, which separates the atriums and the ventricles. We located the four chambers of the heart and saw the left side is larger as it pumps blood all around the body, not just to the lungs. We also found the *chordae tendinae*, otherwise known as "heartstrings" which pull the valves... A real example of the saying, 'pulling at my heartstrings!'

The children did really well! Ava said she was "nervous beforehand, but it was really great fun" and Hollie said that she found it all "very interesting and gave me a good understanding of how the heart worked".

A day we're sure won't be forgotten for a while!

We finish this Module with an experiment to see how exercise affects pulse rates, and to give a scientific reason for any changes found.

Top-Up Shop has its 1st Birthday!



Back then it was called the Pop-up Shop', but now we prefer to use the term 'Top-Up Shop', as it cannot provide a full shop for anyone, but helps to top-up essential supplies.

We're open every Tuesday, and as of February, we're also open on the third Saturday of the month too — to help cater for those working on Tuesdays.

And **Rendlesham Good Neighbour Scheme** will even deliver your bags if you contact them direct (just call 07486 551004).

"Lovely place to meet people, very friendly and helpful. A great help in these hard times."

How it works

The way it works is that our Top-Up Shop receives a delivery from the BASIC Life Charity, based in Felixstowe, who pay into the FareShare scheme, receiving deliveries from local supermarkets. Due to the founder and administrator's connections with the Port of Felixstowe, every now and again they also receive a container of goods which (for whatever reason) have not been made it to their original destination. It's always pot-luck as to what we have delivered, week by week.

"I come across things I've never heard of before!"

Over the past year, offers of financial donations have come in to help support the running of our shop; so we are now in a position to do some occasional shopping (mindful of how we spend the money) to 'top-up' with essentials that our deliveries from BASIC Life are sometimes lacking in.

"A very essential service that is used by many. The Top-Up Shop makes a difference to the welfare of the community."

We are not a food bank; there is no means-testing. No questions are asked; noone is turned away. All are welcome, and we do not keep any contact details.

All are welcome

"I enjoy coming to the top up shop every week. Not only does the extra food really help me but it's a good social atmosphere which gets me out and helps with my mental health."

Customers pay $\pounds 2$ to receive a large re-useable bag the first time they shop with us, into which they select their items from what we have on offer that week.

Sometimes there is fresh produce including vegetables, fruit or bread. On occasion there have even been flowers.

At the *"Welcome Desk"*, you will be given a coloured 'ticket'. There are four colours and they determine the order you access the shop once it opens at 11am. But it also gives the staff time to re-stock before the next group.

We serve Refreshments!

Alongside the shop, open between 10:30am and 12noon-ish, refreshments are served, most usually, by two of our lovely nonagenarians!

Home-made cakes and cheese scones are served with a hot or cold drink, and are available for all donations go back into the *Top-Up Shop* fund. Through this, friendships are being forged and there is a most congenial atmosphere!

"I think it is a lovely place to come, have only just found out about it and wish I had known before. This is a blessing that people that need help are given it by lovely people."

"As a relative new-comer, I have found the top-up shop a blessing. A great help and a place to socialise too."

Additionally, once a quarter, the **Deben Primary Care Network** team, who have direct access to healthcare appointments and can offer signposting for further help, are making a real difference.

The remaining visits for 2023 will be on June 13th, September 12th and on December 12th.

We're just batty about Woodbridge! The TW Bat Project

From June to September 2022, more than 80 random households took part in a bat survey organised by *Transition Woodbridge* with Mark Bowler, a bat expert from the Univ. of Suffolk.

Each month 20 households hosted a post with a bat recorder in a suitable position for a fortnight. At the end of the fortnight, TW volunteers collected up the recorders and passed them on to Mark.

Participants were taken from the Woodbridge and Melton areas. Woodbridge included the area from Sandy Lane to the Seckford roundabout on the A12; for Melton it covered from Wilford Bridge to Ufford Park.

Why count bats?

Bats feed on insects and roost in hedges and old buildings. Their numbers give a good indication of the health of other insect populations — as well as giving us an idea on the availability of the right habitat for them. Mark has arranged for his students to analyse each recorder to identify what types of bats there are in each location, and how many.

The recorders only pick up bat activity, nothing else.

Mark is collating a debrief on **Weds 7th June** at *Woodbridge Community Hall* to explain the findings and talk about the implications for us. Starting at 7pm, admission is free.

We are now in the process of repeating the survey from May 2023 onwards to provide some comparison data for the 2022 set.
