





#### Take care of the trees. and they'll take care of you!

Trees are amazing. These complicated, wonderful lifeforms have been on our planet for thousands of years and they're integral to our survival. But how much do you really know about them?

- 1. There are more than 3 trillion trees on earth - that's 422 times as many trees as people! But at the beginning of human civilisation there were 6 trillion. We've destroyed around half the planet's trees by clearing land for agriculture, urban development and more.
- 2. Trees can 'talk' to each other and even share nutrients through the wood wide web, using special fungi on their roots called mycorrhiza. Trees in forests are connected in giant webs that allow them to communicate and share vital resources like water and even carbon.
- 3. There are around 60,000 species of trees in the world - and about 300 are critically endangered. More than half of all tree species only exist in a single country too, so it's vital that we protect them from threats like deforestation and disease.





- 4. A tree's leaves aren't naturally always green. A chemical called chlorophyll makes them green and during the autumn, less sunlight means less chlorophyll is produced. That's why leaves turn red, vellow, orange and even purple during colder months.
- 5. Trees release chemicals called phytoncides and research has shown that when we breathe them in it can reduce blood pressure, lower anxiety and even increase our pain threshold. Trees can make us happier, more relaxed and more creative.
- 6. As many as 5 billion trees are cut down every year for agriculture and some estimates put this figure as high as 15 billion. We need every tree we have for the

- sake of our planet's future.
- 7. A recent survey found that only 1% of families in Britain could identify our most common trees.
- 8. 2% of the UK's land is covered by 'ancient woodland,' meaning woodland that has existed since the 1600s in England and Wales (and since the 1750s in Scotland).
- 9.The UK's oldest tree is thought to be a yew in Scotland - estimated to be an incredible 3,000 years old.

Heather's Soup Kitchen!



# Roast sprouts with walnuts & pomegranates

Sprouts. The Devil's own vegetable. Nasty little green bomblets of noxious aftergas! But perhaps you love 'em and can't wait for the official moment to enjoy these pellets of poison, but just want another way of cooking them? From 'Delicious' Magazine.



Well, you don't need bacon to pep up the flavour of your Crimbo Sprouts, as this super simple, quick recipe proves, topped off with walnuts and pomegranate seeds.

#### Ingredients

800g trimmed and halved brussels sprouts Vegetable oil 50g walnut halves a handful of fresh sage leaves 2-3 tbsp pomegranate molasses A handful of pomegranate

#### Method

Heat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6. Toss 800g trimmed and halved brussels sprouts with a glug of veg oil on a roasting tray, then roast for 10 minutes. Add 50g walnut halves and a handful of fresh sage leaves, toss to coat, then return to the oven for 5 minutes.

Drizzle 2-3 tbsp pomegranate molasses over, shake the tin to coat everything, then tip onto a warmed serving plate or bowl and scatter over a handful of pomegranate seeds.



As our email accounts continue to be hacked on a daily basis, Suffolk Trading Standards have some advice.



Using 3 random words is a good way to create a strong, unique password that you will remember.

With so many of us spending time online, it's more important than ever we protect our accounts.

Create stronger passwords with three random words. Find out how you can stay Cyber Aware at www.ncsc.gov.uk/ cyberaware/home

If a hacker gets into your email, they could:

- reset your other account passwords
- access information you have saved about yourself or your business

Your email password should be strong and different to all your other passwords. This will make it harder to crack or guess.

Using 3 random words is a good way to create a strong, unique password that you will remember.

You should also protect your other important accounts, such as banking or social media.







## Fun Christmas Facts

# 'Jingle Bells' was the first song played in space.

So you're the first crew in space, floating amongst the stars. What tune do you put on the juke box? Well, the crew of NASA's Gemini 6A space flight got into the Christmas spirit and made history when they played 'Jingle Bells' on 16 December 1965, earning the jolly jingle the Guinness World Record for being the first song ever played in space.

#### The NORAD Santa Tracker was created out of a child's innocent mistake.

The North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) has been tracking Santa's journey around the world since 1958. The innovation was triggered in 1955, when a young child accidentally dialed the unlisted phone number of the Continental Air Defense Command (CONAD) Operations Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado, believing she was calling Santa Claus after seeing a promotion in a local newspaper. The duty commander, Col. Harry Shoup, saw an opportunity to create a little Christmas magic, and assured the child that CONAD would guarantee Santa a safe journey from the North Pole sparking the idea to track Santa's travels each year, to the delight of children all over the world.

that famous tune, count all the gifts bestowed upon the lucky singer in the lyrics—French hens, turtle doves, calling birds, and so much more—you'll end up with 364 presents.

# In Ukraine, spiders are symbols of good luck at Christmas.

When you think about Christmas creatures, spiders don't automatically spring to mind. But in Ukraine, families often add spider-web ornaments to their trees as a reminder of a lovely seasonal story about how these 8-legged critters once used their silky string to decorate the tree of a poor widow and her children.

# A Christmas tree in Spain is worth £11 million.

Most of us have Christmas decorations that we hold dear for sentimental reasons, but the ornaments that adorn the Christmas tree at the Kempinski Hotel Bahia, near Marbella, has a different type of value. The tree is festooned with red, white, pink, and black diamonds, as well as jewelry from Bulgari, Cartier, Van Cleef & Arpels, and Chanel. And just for good measure, you'll also find

3D-printed chocolate peacocks, feathers, ostrich eggs, and bottles of perfume on the tree, which is worth a whopping £11 million!

## Tinsel was once made of real silver.

Throwing some tinsel on your tree has been a quick and inexpensive way to jazz up your holiday décor, for years. But it used to be a much pricier adornment. According to the BBC, tinsel has its origins in the early 1600s in Nuremberg, Germany, where people used thin strands of real silver in their trees to reflect candlelight, as they used to put real candles in their trees. Since silver was expensive, being able to use tinsel in your tree was something of a status symbol.

## Eggnog dates back to medieval times.

For many, Eggnog is the go-to drink of the festive season, one that has a history dating all the way back to medieval times and a drink called 'posset.' Made with sweetened and spiced milk that was curdled with ale or wine and served hot, monks in the 13th century "enjoyed" this mixture with the addition of eggs and figs.



# The first Christmas card ever sent is worth almost £20,000.

On 24 November 2001, a Christmas card was sold at auction in Devizes, Wiltshire, for £20,000, making it the most valuable Christmas card in the world. That's because it was "considered the world's first Christmas card," according to Guinness World Records, which notes that it "was sent by Sir Henry Cole, a Bath-born businessman, to his grandmother in 1843 and is hand-coloured by London illustrator John Calcott Horsley." The lithographed illustration depicts a multigenerational family enjoying a Christmas party and there are only 12 of the original 1,000 cards still in existence.





There will be jingle bells, twinkly lights and Christmas tunes to accompany him all the way as our mobile PA system will be following Santa on his route.







# The day the big cat roared

Across from Rendlesham at the former Bentwaters United States Air Force base, in a Hardened Aircraft Shelter, there lurks a very special rare beast..



Since it opened in 2007, Bentwaters Cold War Museum has been involved in the restoration of aircraft that were seen in Suffolk skies throughout the Cold War, including those that were based at the airfield.

One of them is very special and is believed to be the only fully functional example in RAF specification left. The SEPECAT Jaguar was a jet fighter built for the British and French air forces in the 1960's and 70's by a joint venture between British Aircraft Corporation and Breguet which formed the Société Européenne de Production de l'avion Ecole de Combat et d'Appui Tactique (SEPECAT) to develop and sell the attack and training type.

With the first flight in 1968, it could fly at supersonic speeds,

deliver bombs and missiles, carry out reconnaissance and provide a tactical nuclear strike role. Such was its success that it was exported to India (still in use), Oman, Ecuador and Nigeria and used in numerous conflicts and military operations in Mauritania, Chad, Iraq, Bosnia, and Pakistan. For the United Kingdom and France it was a major contributor to NATO in the latter half of the Cold War and then played a significant part in the Gulf War where the Jaguar was praised for its reliability and performance.

It was not until 1 July 2005 that it was withdrawn from French operations and the Royal Air Force in April 2007 when it was replaced by the Tornado and the Eurofighter Typhoon.

Those who flew and worked on the Jaguar had nothing but praise for the type, something that could not often be said of its contemporaries which proved both difficult to fly and a maintenance challenge!

The museum had acquired several airframes and gained experience with restoration techniques, so when SEPECAT Jaguar GR.1A XX741 became available it was eagerly purchased in 2009 with the help of a very generous donation by long time society member Brian Smee (who sadly passed away last year).

Whilst there was always a desire to effect a restoration to the highest standard (as with all airframes), it soon developed into an ambitious project to return XX741 to ground running, and ultimately fast taxying condition. To do this a dedicated Jaguar restoration team was formed, latterly led by Al Vernon who had worked on the type in RAF service. Museum Manager, Graham Haynes, also being ex-RAF, has been the guiding force behind the project. The financing, which is of eve-watering magnitude, has also been managed separately from the museum. Over the years, a number of Jaguar-experienced ex-RAF personnel have joined the volunteers and provided the knowledge and skills necessary to operate a military jet with

afterburners! This includes aircrew to perform the taxi runs. As each step was achieved, the ambition grew.

The first-phase roll out occurred in 2013 with many of the basics restored and working. A quantum leap was needed to get to fast-taxi condition which took another seven years. In early 2020, the magnificent sight of a roaring Cat was witnessed by the team as it hurtled down the Bentwaters runway in a test at fast taxi speed...over 100 mph!

Recently, a special photo shoot was organised for aviation

enthusiasts who came from far afield to see the Jaguar (some from Belgium and the Netherlands as well as Scotland, Wales and Cornwall), to photograph it in an authentic setting with re-enactors dressed in the correct clothing and using original ground equipment.

It was held late afternoon and into the evening to make full use of the fading light and create the atmosphere of a Cold War frontline attack jet being readied for a mission.

A great deal of planning and work was involved in holding


the event for the 80 guests with safety a priority. Access to the Jaguar to take the photos and having a good time was the aim of the museum with guests escorted around the airfield, food outlet and toilets set up, and original military mobile lighting trolleys in place out in the dark unlit area chosen as the set. As someone remarked, it was like a Hollywood film set! Despite the rain and cold the feedback from everyone was very positive.


Plans are being made to see the Jag in action again with it is hoped a taxi run in the spring.

The restoration of the Jaguar has been an astonishing achievement and the museum and the volunteers are rightly proud of being able to claim the only Jaguar to have been returned to working order and capable of a fast taxi. The Big Cat lives to prowl and roar




